Dear Ones:

Hope you are enjoying your Fall so far. We are well into the county fair season, with some already having turned to memories. But, we both have the Waller County Fair



and the Austin County Fair to look forward to during October. When we first made the full time shift to country living over a decade ago, we were so amused to have school holidays for the days of the county fair. This tradition is one we only get to enjoy in rural Texas, as those big urban school districts would never dream of letting all those kids miss school when so few of them have ever stepped foot into a barn, let alone a county fair.

This year I have already attended the Fayette County Fair in LaGrange to see the ZZ Top concert. It was fun to load up in a big yellow school bus in the corn field where we parked, and to ride in those timeless, familiar seats up fairgrounds. The midway was just lighting up as the sun went down, and the distinctive odor of livestock was in the air. All the city folks were holding their noses, standing in contrast compared to the kids scrubbing their fair animals. As an old 4-H Horse Project kid and then leader, it made me smile to remember all those scrubbing moments, especially since my paint pony was a mad expert in rolling in horse manure EVERY evening before we were to show the next morning—never on a brown spot but smack dab in the middle of the beautiful white clean coat I had so carefully washed the day before.

Living in the country is such a blessing. We get to smell all those barnyard animals and step in that mystery poop once in a while, and if it came from a grass eater, it's not too bad!! We have open fields and full forests and burn piles and donkeys who bray a

greeting when we return home. WE even have a scarred up barn cat who shows up once every few weeks to remind us to fill the cat food bowl.

We also have pretty strong faith communities in the country. Most people have a church family. On Sunday we gather together to urge one another forward for another week, and to share the week behind us. It is nice to have that extended family to look forward to seeing each week. That connection is part of the human condition and it is healthy and important to our wellbeing.

Imagine though that someone in your community does not have a faith home. Often it is just because they were never asked, or were never invited, or never knew when or how to join the community. We need to do a better job of asking others if they have a faith community, and if not, go ahead and invite them to join us. Think about all the places you see people. Every single interaction is an opportunity to invite people to your faith community.

And while we are thinking about our faith community, consider our building and how we might use it every day of the week. We need to use this beautiful building of ours. Doing so builds our community. We have some ideas in the works from Mandala Monday (for those who like to color); Crafts Tuesday (for our hand craft people); Yoga Eucharist Tuesday early evening (for a gentle stretch and body prayer ending in Eucharist); Meals on Wheels (meets here every week a couple of days); ECW Bible & Brene' Monday evenings; Blessing of the Pets with 4 Paws Farm; Pardoning of the Turkey; and more. What do think would be fun, or even educational?

I love living in the country in small town Texas, and I love sharing my faith life with each of you. Make sure your friends feel welcome at our faith community by inviting them this month to join us.

Barks from Brother Brownie

Hey all you PET PEOPLE:

I got a phone call the other day—the man from 4 Paws Farm rescue called the church because he heard there was a priest who had a dog for an assistant—then I heard the Rev tell the guy he had it wrong as it was a dog who had a priest for an assistant. Well, he was calling to invite all of us to participate in a community-wide Blessing of the pets, and he wanted the Rev to come, and even wanted me to go, too. Now I guess I need to be clear, I am not a party dog. I may or may not attend this event.

I do not like big gatherings of dogs or even people. I like this church because I feel I get to see everyone on Sundays after church. I also get to greet a few who get there before I am "locked up." I have been to lots of parties and often they involve dogs and kids, and when everyone starts running around and jumping and barking, I hate that. I have even been known to run up to a wildly barking dog and snarl for them to be quiet. I mean, they should be more dignified. The old Rev sometimes calls me the "fun police," and all because it falls to me to discipline those who get a little too excited.

You know, I think I am a contemplative. I like my quiet time to meditate and quietly think about the world and God and his beloved Son, Christ. This month is always full of activities with Blessing of the Pets and Halloween and all kinds of outdoor activities. I still like the quiet moments when I can bask in the sun with cool air beginning to seep in.

So this month I will share some of my theology: that of a Christian mystic dog. Martha Ainsworth has a wonderful website about the topic, but among the most interesting things she reminds us not to get lost in the words. She says:

A Note On Terminology: Contemplative spirituality was once called "Christian mysticism." The word "mysticism" was intended to convey the sense that humanity cannot fully understand God; God is a "mystery." Unfortunately, fundamentalists and others have now coopted the word "mysticism" and use it to describe occult practices. Such things have never been an element of Christian mysticism. The classic tradition of Christian mysticism is unrelated to the paranormal or occult; it involves no secret knowledge, no divination, no special powers, and nothing outside the Bible. It is 100% orthodox Christianity. Christian mysticism, also called contemplative spirituality, is a way of focusing one's life completely on God, through prayer, living in love, and an awareness of God's presence. To avoid misunderstanding, what once called "Christian was mysticism" is now more frequently referred to as "contemplative spirituality."

So I am like St. Benedict or Julian of Norwich, who were also Christian mystics. And all of this is based on the fundamental wisdom saying of Jesus in the Sermon on the Mount:

"...when you pray, go to your inner room, close the door and pray to your Father in secret. And your Father, who sees in secret, will repay you." Matthew 6.6 (New American Bible)

Maybe we can learn to pray quietly side by side. Just don't get too excited.

Yoga Eucharist is Here

Beginning October 13 from 5-6:30pm in the Parish Hall we will gather together with our yoga mats (we will have a few for sale) and guided by Personal Trainer Janet Melnar and Rev. Wendy through a gentle stretching and intentional series of yoga poses which will be related to scripture, prayer and culminating in Eucharist at the end of the session.



Exercise With Purpose

Yoga had origins in Indian culture but just as the very tree we place our presents under during Christmas, we as Christians have realized we can remain fully Christian and stretch and quiet our breathing while worshipping God and His Son Christ.

According to the *Encyclopedia Britannica* and other sources, the origins of the Christmas tree are closely tied to pagan winter rites and even tree worship among pre-Christian Europeans. What did Christians do? They took something that had been used in pagan rituals (the tree) and re-interpreted it, giving it new meaning as a symbol of the Christian faith. There is even a story that Saint Boniface cut down an oak tree that

German pagans were worshipping and replaced it with an evergreen tree, showing how its triangular shape reminded one of the Trinity and how it pointed to heaven.



St. Augustine said, "Wherever truth may be found, it belongs to the Lord." Sometimes this sentiment is expressed as, "All truth is God's truth"—the point being, if something is true and good, it is ultimately a gift from God, wherever it is found.

So if stretching our muscles, breathing deeply, and staying present in the moment can actually can help heal and restore our bodies and minds—then isn't it essentially of God?


Our Yoga class will be a body prayer to our Lord and Savior and finish by celebrating the most Holy Meal—Holy Eucharist. Join us!




Mandalas and More

Beginning October 5 from 1-3 pm we will meet at the church and color together. We will create and color Mandalas or just color in some of the wonderful "grownup" coloring books we are gathering.

The word Mandala (pronunciation mondah- lah) means "circle". A Mandala represents wholeness, a diagram reminding us of our relation to infinity, extending beyond and within our bodies and minds. The mandala appears to us in all aspects of life, the Earth, the Sun, the Moon and more obviously the circles of life encompassing friends, family and communities. Mandalas are circular designs symbolizing the notion that life is never ending. Many mandalas have spiritual significance to an individual or group of individuals. The Hindus were one of the first people to use a mandala as a spiritual tool, but the mandalas have been used through the ages in many faith traditions and cultures. Think of the Labyrinth or the Rose Window in so many of our churches.



Within the Christian tradition, the use of geometric designs as a part of prayer and reflection has a rich history. Among the Celtic Christians, monks copied the scriptures and illuminated the text with intricate designs, shapes, and creatures, showing that they had a love for the written word, amazing focus and skill, and a sense of humor. One of the greatest of these Gospel books is the 9th century Book of Kells.



In the 11th century, a nun and abbess named Hildegard of Bingen, writer of plays, music, and handbooks of medicine, designed complex mandalas based on visions she had during prayer.

Mandalas can be created by individuals to symbolize their journeys through life. Mandalas can also tell a story of where an individual has been. In some cases they will reveal the individual's path in life. Groups can create mandalas that will reveal what they should be doing in order to grow and develop as a group.
